

The Ramsbottom Urban District Council (1894-1974), it governed an area bounded to the south by Holcombe Brook and Summerseat and part of Hawkshaw; to the north by Edenfield, Irwell Vale, Lumb, Stubbins and the hamlets of Chatterton and Strongstry; to the west by Holcombe and to the east by Shuttleworth, Park and Turn Village.

Ramsbottom Paper Mill

Ramsbottom Cricket Club

1845 - Ramsbottom Cricket Club was founded in 1845. In 1864 the club established Acre Bottom. Notable among the founders were three members of the Stead family & two members of the Grant family. William Grant was the first President of the club from 1869 to 1874.

Clock on the front of the pavilion roof. Inscription on the clock face "RCC" "Founded 1845".

1910 - Between the old Pavilion and the Paper Mill boundary was a tennis court. 1910 OS Map.

Ramsbottom Football Club

1966 - Ramsbottom United Football Club, Harry Williams Riverside Stadium, Acre Bottom. Ramsbottom United was founded in 1966, and one of the founders, Harry Williams, is still, Chairman.

1997 the club installed floodlights for the first time – acquiring a set from the Watersheddings ground of Oldham Rugby League Club.

2010 stadium was named “Harry Williams Riverside Stadium”.

The Aitken Memorial and Jubilee Cottage Hospital formerly opened by Mrs Mary Aitken on the 18th April 1900. Subsequently changed its name to Aitken Memorial Cottage Hospital. Plans were drawn up C.S.Haywood of the architects' practice Haywood and Harrison of Accrington. Its construction was funded by Mrs Mary Aitken, a member of a local mill owning family. Originally with 9 beds, extended in 1936 at a cost of £4000, paid for by Lt Colonel and Mrs A.T. Porritt.

The seven foot pediment from the top of the original hospital building, which features a family crest of the Aitken family and the inscription "Ramsbottom Cottage Hospital AD 1898", has been placed at the entrance of the new housing development - Jubilee Gardens 2016.

The stain glass window from the hospital is on display at Ramsbottom Library, Carr Street.

NUTTALL PARK

Nuttall Park is a large 10.70-hectare urban community park in Ramsbottom. Nuttall Park has retained a Green Flag Award since 2005.

National Cycle Network Route 6 goes through the park.

Bronze Plaque 1928 replica bronze plaque commemorating Lt Col Porritt's gift of the park and hall to the people - Inscription "Replica Plaque 2008. Lt. Col. Porritt (1875-1956) of The Cliffs and Stubbins Vale Mill was a leading public figure and local benefactor. He believed people had a right to enjoy recreational facilities and open spaces."

Nuttall Hall Interpretation Board. Installed 2008. It was followed by the opening of 'Nuttall Extravaganza' on 12th July 2008. an afternoon of celebration to mark 80 years of the park.

Bandstand, 1930s photo shows series of pillars with a pitched tiled roof.

2019 - Base renovated and hardcore surround and path added. Partly funded by the Council, Friends of Nuttall Park and the RHS.

2022 - The roof and columns installed. Partly funded by the Council and the RHS.

2023 – The bandstand finished. 1st October 2023 official opening of the new bandstand by the Mayor of Bury at 1pm. Music in the park will be provided by Besses o' th' Barn Band and the Rossendale Ukulele Band. Regular Sunday Concerts held during the Summer.

The Jubilee Climbing Rocks project was completed in May, 2003. They are not a sculpture but for climbing. The plaque states *'The Jubilee Climbing Rocks. Sir Edmund Hillary, on climbing Mount Everest in 1953 said "It's not the mountain we conquer but ourselves" Stone donated By Marshalls PLC, Ramsbottom and installed by Draxeda Construction. Funded by Friends of Nuttall Park.'*

Fenced Children's Play Area.

2024 – Children's play area renovated.

HOLCOMBE

The name Holcombe is derived from two separate words. "Hol" is Saxon for hollow and "cwm" is Celtic for a semi-circular hollow in a hillside. The description is in close agreement with the site of the present day village.

1852 Peel Monument, Holcombe Hill. **Grade 2 Listed.**

Date stone (JBT) inscription over door "Peel". The Monument, 128 feet high, was erected between 1851/52 at a cost of £900. All paid for by Joshua Knowles. Designed by the members of the Monument Committee: Grant, Ashton, Knowles, Gorton and possibly Cunliffe. The foundation was laid in October, 1851, by Messrs. Grant, Ashton, Knowles, and Gorton, each laying one of the corner stones. At the instance of William Grant, Chairman, the Tower was built in line with St Andrew's Church Tower as viewed from his own Nuttall Hall.

NUTTALL VILLAGE

"Few hundred yards down the valley from Ramsbottom, and at the lower extremity of the " S " which the sinuous course of the Irwell forms in crossing the holm below Nuttall Hall, stands the old village of Nuttall. On the higher ground overlooking it, on the west, is the old home of the De Notoghs, and about 450 yards up the eastern side of the holm — the river spanned by a bridge intervening — is the modern Nuttall Hall. The village is close to the point where, in the far remote past, the river has gradually ploughed its way through the superincumbent deposits, right down to its present rocky bed, and thus drained the holm and the ground on which the lower part of Ramsbottom is built".

"The village of Nuttall has memories of its own, to which " owd Nutta-ites " cling with great affection and tenacity. For fifty years or more after it came into the hands of the Grants, it was a busy, thriving, populous village, long tended in all its interests, with a kind of paternal care, by Mr John Grant of Nuttall Hall. Mrs Grant, kindly and generous-hearted as her husband, likewise, for much of that time, took a genuine interest in its people.'^ We have often heard old residents, who knew it in its palmy days, expatiate with enthusiasm on its charms. To such there was no place, in days of yore, to be compared with Nuttall".

Yet much of the charm of the old environment remains, in the steep wooded banks of the river, from which the fields sweep up on the eastern side to Top o' th' Hoof, and in the demesne of Nuttall Hall, which comes within about two hundred yards of the village gates."

"Is an extensive township on the east bank of the Irwell, extending from about two to five miles from Bury. It contains 5,065 acres, and its rateable value amounts to £85,921. The population in 1851 was 4,802; 1861, 5,298; 1871, 5,558; and 1881, 5,519. In Walmersley are the remains of a beacon, probably erected in the time of Queen Elizabeth, under the influence of the threatened invasion from the Spanish armada. On a neighbouring hill a prospect tower was erected by the Grants in 1829, and a better situation could scarcely have been found. In a clear atmosphere the estuary of the Mersey, near Runcorn, is seen from this elevated station".

SUMMERSEAT

It is a village situated in the three townships of Tottington Lower End, Elton, and Walmersley, and is a station on the East Lancashire line of railway, about 2 miles from Bury, and 1 mile from Ramsbottom. During the 1600s and 1700s the area of Brooksbottom and Summerseat contained only scattered farms and hand-loom weavers' cottages in a rural setting. The earliest reference to Summerseat is from 1556 when it was known as 'summersett', meaning a hut or shelter used in summertime. Rowlands is an obscure name which may indicate that this area once belonged to a man called Rowland. In 1699, Edward Hamer, a fustian manufacturer from Tonge-within Bolton purchased the estate of Higher and Lower Summerseat. Soon afterwards he built Peel Hall, which is dated 1706 above one of the doorways. Peel Hall originally had a Pele tower, or a fortified house with two to four storeys, attached. The estate passed to his son, Richard, who enlarged it and thence to Samuel who again added to Peel Hall in 1759.

On 26 April 1826, rioting Luddites were read the Riot Act at Chatterton by the 60th Rifle Corps (later to become known as the King's Royal Rifle Corps). Ignoring the reading of the act, the mob attempted to destroy looms at Aitken and Lord's factory whereupon the soldiers eventually opened fire, killing 4 men and wounding many others.

1890s - The remains of Chatterton mill were demolished towards the end of the 19th century.

1923 - site was made into Chatterton Playing Field - Peace Memorial. The plaque reads, "Chatterton Playing Field Peace Memorial. The land was generously given to Ramsbottom Urban District Council for public use and enjoyment and in thanksgiving for peace following the great war, by Lieutenant Colonel

Austin T Porritt of The Cliff, Stubbins Vale 1923. It is the site of Chatterton Mill where the riot took place in 1826."

The playing fields were opened on 14th April 1923, having been laid out by Lt. Col. Austin Townsend Porritt and given to the people of Ramsbottom as a "Peace Memorial".

The line was reopened by the East Lancashire Railway on 27th April 1981, but the station remains closed, one platform and parts of the buildings can still be seen.

On 25 September 1916 a 179m-long German military Zeppelin airship flew over the area, attempting to inflict damage on the transport system. It dropped bombs on Ewood Bridge & Edenfield station which was destroyed. The L21, a Zeppelin commanded by Oberleutnant Kurt Frankenburg of the Imperial German Navy, then went on to drop five bombs on the village of Holcombe on its way to Bolton.

FOE EDGE FARM

At Foe Edge Farm in 1865 the dialect writer and poet, Edwin Waugh (29th January 1817 to 30th April 1890) was invited to stay by his friend Edmund Chattwood of Bury. He spent some months there and on this and later visits he produced some of his best work. In 1866 Mr Chattwood built a well at the farm in his honour. This memorial has been rebuilt on the centenary in 1966, and a bust has been added.

IRWELL VALE

Irwell Vale near Edenfield, is one of several small settlements in the valley between Stubbins and Rawtenstall. It stands where two rivers, the Ogden and the Irwell, meet and owes its existence to John Bowker, a Manchester merchant. Bowker built a woollen mill on the east side of the Irwell in about 1800 and some thirty-two years later added a cotton mill on the opposite bank. In 1833 two rows of workers' cottages were completed and the new village had been born. For many years the mill was leased to the Aitken family and eventually they bought the entire village. The street names, Aitken Street and Bowker Street, recall them and the original owner.

METHODIST CHAPEL off Bowker Street

Work began on 31st March 1893 with the laying of the foundation stones, one by W. J. Porritt and another by Haslingden's first mayor, Thomas Bewley Hamilton. Just seven months later the new building was ready, having cost a total of £1925, including everything from the purchase of the land to the installation of the organ. The chapel opened on 22nd October 1893. Seats for 250; pews; no hall and one other room.

IRWELL STATION

The station opened the same day as the East Lancashire Railway extension line to Rawtenstall from Ramsbottom on the 27th April 1887. To replace the station at Ewood Bridge further up the line, where the platforms can still be seen.

LUMB MILL

The history of Lumb Mill is covered comprehensively in John Simpson's Book, "*A History of Edenfield and District*".

Towards the end of the 18th century the Formby Family of Formby Hall owned the Lumb Hall Estate. It was not until the 1820s that Rev. Richard Formby built a mill himself and installed water wheels and associated heavy gearing.

The old tombstone originally placed here in 1709 was broken by a horse drawn plough. It was then renovated in July 1935. Though decaying with age and weatherworn, the original stone still displays its 'horse cracks', and is inscribed in that old delightful English lettering:-

"Here lies the body of Roger Worthington who departed this life the 9th day of July 1709, about the 30th year of his age. They that serve Christ in faith and love, shall ever reign with him above".

The new stone is inscribed:-

"This stone commemorates the death and burial of Roger Worthington, a Baptist Preacher who ministered in the neighbourhood for many years."
